Overview

Grade 7 Textile Arts and Design is a lab focused program designed to introduce students to the numerous aspects related to clothing and textile arts. This course enables students to develop practical life skills that will allow them to contribute to family and/or community life. The nature of this class provides an opportunity for students to learn new skills and apply them in a concrete manner promoting the development of a sense of self and confidence.

The topics we will be covering this year are:

1. Understanding the impact of textile art and design on our daily lives.

- Clothing choices and personal expression
- Adding personal expression to clothing
- Careers related to sewing, textile art and design

2.Selecting and using technological applications in textiles.

- Developing skills in the use of technology for sewing
- Designing and creating a sewing project

3. Gathering and using knowledge of textiles to become more informed consumers.

- Demonstrating an awareness of fibres and fabric construction techniques
- Using knowledge of textiles to make wise decisions related to clothing selection and care

Assessment and Evaluation

Assessment and evaluation tools will include quizzes, assignments, journals, in-class assignments, projects, group work, and self-assessment.

All curriculum outcomes in Textile Art and Design will be marked on a four point rubric.

In the family studies courses, students will have the opportunity to work independently, in pairs and in groups. Students will learn the value of working collaboratively and cooperatively.
